We have all seen so many acts of individual heroism this summer on the news – strangers helping strangers in the mass shootings in Las Vegas, neighbours digging people from collapsed buildings in earthquakes, citizens pulling together during the terrible hurricanes in the south.


Of course, we hope there will never be any reason for us to have to resort to this in our own community, but deep down, we all know it could happen. I remember (because I have been

around for a long time) when I was an elementary student, we had “nuclear drills” where we hid under the desks. Now THAT’S wishful thinking.

I recently saw on the news that a Dunbar community group has organized an emergency preparedness plan based on a Seattle model. It is very impressive. This is their website - we could be BEEP! <http://dunbar-deep.ca/site/index.php>. They have organized community meeting places where everyone meets in a disaster, they have trained leaders, and established bulletin boards for use when there is no other means of communication. It is a useful and quick means of co-ordinating rescue efforts and ensuring that there is some organization in a situation where chaos exists. They hold drills where the community comes out and participates, and they have a good time as well as get to meet more of their neighbours. There is no downside to anyone in this approach.

I wouldn't be surprised if there is funding for this sort of thing from one level of government or another. I could see from the news article that they have managed to combine fun neighbourhood spirit with a serious matter, and engaged a large part of their community.

This would be a worthwhile endeavour for our community as well. As we already have an active community association, I would suggest we get started with this.

CART NEWS: Dollars & Sense

“**What is garbage? Not much!**” as it says in the new guide for recycling, organics and garbage. So many materials can be returned to the recycling drop-off at the transfer station, besides all the stuff that is picked up at the curb. Use some of your old bins to collect your recyclables that need to be taken to the depot. Why put stuff in the landfill if you don't need to?

Here are a few interesting details about the new garbage and organics carts:

- If you **downsize** to the 140L garbage cart, you will **save \$40 per year** on the utilities portion of your annual tax bill – note that it is the **cart size that counts**, not how much garbage you put in it, or how often you put it out.
- Each household is allowed an **additional 240L organics cart** at no charge.
- There is a 4 week mandatory waiting period before you can request additional carts or change cart sizes (single family homes were already given the largest size, 240L, so can only change to the smaller size, 140L). **Zone 4 households exchange period starts Oct.19**; Zone 5 won't be getting their new carts until December.
- The **\$50 admin fee** will be **waived** if you make changes **within one month** of the start of the exchange period (Zone 4, by Nov.19 - possibly even within 2017).
- <http://www.dnv.org/get-different-cart-size> is the link to find the form to request more or change carts
- Remember, you can't put out **any** old carts or bins at all, and any paper bags or bundles of branches must be placed inside the new organics carts. If you've been using multiple bins for yard waste, you might find you need a second organics cart. If you want more than 2 carts, additional ones will increase your annual utilities bill by \$40 each.
- There will be a chance to recycle any old garbage or green cans that you don't wish to keep - we'll get a sticker on our carts when the date is announced, or you can check online for the date (not posted for Zone 4 at time of writing) <http://www.dnv.org/programs-services/new-carts-residents>

So save yourself a few dollars – less garbage makes sense!

Proposed Multi-Family Residential Project

Although it is not in Blueridge/Seymour Heights, per se, a redevelopment proposal at 904-944 Lytton Street could have some impact on Blueridge/Seymour Heights.

The Seymour Estates, which was built in 1969, has been bought out by Anthem Properties, who intend to completely redevelop the site in question. From the current 114 units, this will nearly triple to 333 units in 15 buildings, varying from 3, 4 to 6 storeys in height. The project will include 43 rental units. There will be 599 parking stalls.

Due to the increase in density this will have to go to a Public Hearing at the DNV Hall before it gets approved.

The developer is hoping to get the approval to start the redevelopment in the spring of 2018, and the combined construction time

for the totally 333 units is estimated to be four years (completion in 2022).



DOES YOUR FURNACE OR GAS FIREPLACE NEED SERVICING?

Our finances are not what they used to be... In order to properly celebrate Blueridge Good Neighbour Day's 20th anniversary in June this year we spent quite a bit more money than we usually do.

Our scholarship program is great, but is costing us \$500 every year.

Our Blueridge Sharing Garden is costing us nearly \$1,000 in insurance alone every year.

In short: we know that we will have to do something. Rather than cutting back on our expenses we would prefer to start generating more income.

At a meeting about this topic in September it was agreed NOT to apply membership fees – we want every person in our community to automatically be a member.

It was also decided that – at this point – we did not want to include ads in our newsletter or advertize at our meetings. The newsletter is made by community members for community members and is not printed to advertize for any business, be it local or multi-national! So far so good, but it still does not give us any income.

We are likely to have the occasional fund-raiser, such as a pub night and possibly wine tasting.

Below are a few technical details a potential candidate will need to know:

-The website is fully built on Wordpress.

-Our current hosting provider uses CPanel, which is the most common software out there to deal with websites.

-The only fully custom piece in our website is the Babysitter directory. This is built by the Contact Form 7 plugin. Alberto will be more than happy to give an introduction to the potential candidate

-There is not much custom code that needs to be known, any person with real knowledge in the field will find out that the environment is, in fact, quite easy, as Alberto had automatized as much as he could.

-So there you have it, if you have a bit of website experience and you feel that you could work with the above tools and you feel that you would like to help out the BCA, we would love to hear from you! In that case please contact us at: info@blueridge.ca and let us know. Alberto may wish to have a chat with you to make sure that you fully understand all that is needed.

-The time involved (that question always comes up!) is likely to vary depending on what kind of 'hiccups' we encounter, particularly with the website. RECIPE CORNER!

Bocconcini & Tomatoes...Blueridge Style!

Enjoy your next autumn dinner with a light, lovely, and tasty salad.

This is a favorite in our family. I love to purchase heirloom tomatoes for the beautiful colors! This salad is sure to impress anyone!

Salad:

375 GR Bocconcini (or Burrata is also just as lovely!)

500 GR Fresh Tomatoes

50 GR Sun-dried tomatoes

50 ML Chopped Basil

30 GR Toasted Pine nuts (optional)

Dressing:

2 TBL Red wine Vinegar

¼ tsp Black pepper

1 Clove garlic , minced

Salt

½ cup Extra Virgin Olive Oil

Directions:

Slice tomatoes and bocconcini into approx. ½" slices. Arrange attractively on a plate, layering tomato, bocconcini, tomato...etc. Sprinkle thinly sliced sun-dried tomatoes, basil, and pine nuts on top. Pour dressing over this and let sit 30 minutes. Serves 4-6... Enjoy!!



At the BCA's Annual General Meeting on May 23, 2017, the current Chair, Eric Godot Andersen pointed out the following highlights for the BCA for 2016-2017:

FIRST OF ALL: A HUGE 'THANK YOU' TO EVERYONE WHO HAS VOLUNTEERED HIS/HER TIME TO THE BCA. Although it may sound totally like a cliché, it is a fact that the BCA could not operate without all YOUR assistance, directors, volunteers and meeting participants.

1/ our scholarship was handed out to a Blueridge youth for the third time

2/ we decided to have our finances audited by local residents for the first time, in view of the amount in the bank (exceeding \$15,000 at the end of the fiscal year, February 28) and found a couple of volunteers

3/ our partnership was continued with UBC, although on a smaller scale

4/ the BCA has started working with the District of North Vancouver to explore ways to help owners with BC Hydro transformer boxes on their property with 'Decorative Wrap Installation', should they be interested

5/ a well-attended All Candidates Meeting was co-sponsored with other local associations prior to the provincial election in May, 2017

6/ BCA meetings continued to be held every second month (September, November, January, March and May).

7/ we had a couple of guest speakers – David Cook, local biologist (November) and Tom Walker, North Shore Safety Council (March)

8/ three newsletters (May 2016 (8 pages), Nov 2016 (8 pages) and March 2017 (4 pages)) were prepared in 2016-2017 which reached every household in Blueridge/Seymour Heights (thanks strictly to volunteers!). Another newsletter is scheduled to be distributed during the second half of May 2017.

9/ the BCA hosted a very successful 19th Blueridge Good Neighbour Day on June 5, 2016, at the Blueridge Elementary School. A committee is working hard on the 20th BGND.

10/ the BCA general account as at February 28 (end of the fiscal year) had a negative balance - but we have money earmarked as seed-money for Blueridge Good Neighbour Day and a bit of money left over from the Farmers' Market and a small amount for the Blueridge Sharing Garden.

11/ the BCA has a regularly updated website: www.blueridgeca.org and Facebook page as well as our main e-mail address: info@blueridgeca.org. We have about 430 e-mail recipients in Blueridge/Seymour Heights (gone up from 275 last year).

We have a Twitter account located @BlueridgeCA (if people want to "follow" us). Different hashtags associated with our other account are: #BGND2017 and #SharingGarden

In 2016/2017 we have encountered lots of problems with our website and had to change service provider for that reason.

12/ the BCA has notified its members of numerous meetings and events of potential interest to them. This is done through our Communication Officer's 'Blueridge Bulletin' which goes out monthly.

13/ the BCA has representatives on the Community Advisory Panel, Canlan Ice-Sports Committee, the Highway Interchange working group, the Seymour Local Plan Monitoring Committee, the Neighbourhood Advisory Committee and North Vancouver Community Associations Network (NVCAN).

14/ the BCA has a traffic committee (ad hoc), a Blueridge Good Neighbour Day committee, a trails committee (hosting walks in the neighbourhood), a Blueridge Sharing Garden committee, a scholarship committee (ad hoc), a Good Neighbour Greeting committee, a nominating committee and a Community Lands Task Force (ad hoc). Most committee chairs will make a brief presentation at the AGM.

15/ the BCA has met with the Superintendent for the North Vancouver School District 44 about the future of Blueridge Elementary School

16/ the BCA has its own brochure and biz cards with social media information 17/ the BCA continues to offer a baby sitting service

18/ the BCA continued to assist local Syrian families in Blueridge

19/ the BCA had another highly successful 'meet and greet' your neighbours aimed primarily at new Blueridge/Seymour Heights residents (in January) with special invited guests from local agencies and organizations
