


If you have ever wondered what a program like this can accomplish, this note makes it clear:

Get Ready for Multi-Family Zoning in Blueridge

Recently passed provincial legislation (part of a suite of housing reforms introduced this fall by the Provincial government) will have some significant impacts on the Blueridge neighbourhood, and indeed on all single-family neighbourhoods in municipalities exceeding a population of 5,000 across the Province. Our neighbourhood will be zoned for Small-Scale Multi-family housing. The recommended acronym is "SSMUH".

The new laws will eliminate single-family zoning as of June 30, 2024. Put simply, as of June 30, 2024, the whole of Blueridge will be zoned multi-family. On lots less than 280 square meters (3,000 square feet, say 30 feet by 100 feet) the owner will be permitted to build 3 attached living units. On lots over 280 square meters (virtually every lot in Blueridge and elsewhere) the owner can build up to four units. In locations within 400 meters of frequent transit service, which would not currently include Blueridge, but includes areas around Lynn Valley and Norgate, the owner will be able to build up to six units on lots over 280 square metres. In areas with frequent transit service, the legislation prevents local governments from imposing parking requirements.

Exactly what impact these legislative changes will have on Blueridge will turn on a number of still-unknown factors. To start, one would expect that the price of housing in Blueridge would rise, given the increased development potential of the lots. Beyond that, there remains uncertainty as to the kinds of tenure that will be permitted on these multi family lots (strata versus rental only), the permitted Floor Space Ratio ("FSR") and set back requirements. Presumably, the Provincial government will introduce regulations mandating liberalized FSR and set back requirements that will better accommodate multi-family units.

Beyond all of this, there remains the question of how the for-profit development industry will respond to these changes. Where will the market see opportunities for increased profit? In Blueridge, for example, will the highest and best use economically for the existing lots be multi-family units, and if so, of what kind? Time will tell how the market will respond to these unprecedented across-the-board zoning changes.

However, one thing for sure, the re-zoning of single-family zones into multifamily zones will have long-term and significant impacts. June 30, 2024 will mark the onset of big changes on our residential streets in Blueridge and indeed across the Province.

2023 Year in Review from MLA Susie Chant

I have only been your MLA for three years now, but 2023 has been, by far, our busiest in terms of the amount of legislation and policy we passed. A full year in

review would be too long to fit into this article so I will focus only on what we have accomplished in North Vancouver, especially items relevant to Blueridge residents.

The housing front was where a lot of the largest work was done this year. This autumn, we set the five year housing targets for North Vancouver District, with 2838 net-new homes required. This number was set to be an achievable target, with a focus on affordable and supportive housing. To help meet these targets, we have also expanded multi-family zoning, with most lots in Blueridge now being eligible to build 3 to 4 units on their lot. We also funded the preservation of affordable housing with over \$700,000 to Parkgate Housing Society for repairs of the Atrium Seniors Co-op.

We have been funding infrastructure projects across the North Shore as well this year! This includes over \$10 million to the District of North Vancouver to help build infrastructure and keep property taxes affordable. Close to home for residents of Blueridge includes a new Phibbs Exchange, a new pedestrian bridge across Thomas Creek, \$800,000 for shoreline restoration along Whey-Ah-Wichen (Cates Park), \$260,000 for a longhouse plan at Say-Nuth-Khaw-Yum Park (Indian Arm), and over \$200,000 for new education facilities at Maplewood Flats.


Beyond general infrastructure, there was also a specific focus this year on improving public safety. This is, in part, thanks to a new Ministry of Emergency Response led by Bowinn Ma. In North Vancouver this focus took the form of over \$160,000 in grants for emergency response, flood assessment and mitigation work along the Seymour River, \$40,000 in vision-zero grants to help improve pedestrian safety, two new safer crosswalks near Highway 1 off-ramps, and a commitment to pedestrian improvements at Anne Macdonald Way!

Another spectacular accomplishment this year was the distribution of over \$1 million to North Shore Libraries, on top of their annual funding, to create more digital resources and expand services. We also provided over \$375,000 to North Shore festivals and fairs, to help bring communities together. Finally, we continue to expand the affordable childcare in the region with \$10-a-day childcare now operating in eleven locations across the North Shore.

While I could go on, this article covers some of the main highlights of the year. I will be posting some more general highlights on my social media, and you can

always reach out to me about any topics or areas of interest that you want to learn more about. Coyotes 101

Coyotes are highly intelligent, emotive and social animals. They have adapted to living all over North and Central America, in rural and urban environments. Let's learn about their annual milestones, and the family groups they tend to live in.

- January courtship begins
- Early to Mid February mating (mostly 2-3 years old when they begin mating, but as young as 1 year old)
- Spring den selection (they will choose multiple underground dens)
- Early to mid April pups are born after 63 days gestation.
- March September pup rearing
- Fall or Spring dispersal of juveniles, yearlings, or mature coyotes to establish their own territory. Or, they may remain with the family group to help raise the next litter.

Coyotes can be solitary, but more often live in a pair or a family group. A family group has a dominant pair that mates, and they will actively discourage younger members from reproducing. Other members are usually daughters (males tend to disperse to mate). The dominant pair is usually monogamous, often for life (especially in urban areas). In a stable family group, the litters are usually smaller (3-5). A family that has been disrupted by the killing of members will have larger litters (up to ten). Pup mortality is high in the first two years: typically only 1/3 to 1/2 survive to adulthood.

Coyotes that live in a family group have better survival rates: the pregnant female can rest more and the male and other family members will help supply her and the pups with food by hunting and bringing food back to the natal den and regurgitating it. If one parent is killed, the other family members will continue to raise the pups. And coyotes will sometimes adopt pups if their parents have been killed or separated.

Pups only weigh 250 grams at birth. After ten days their eyes open and their ears are erect. At 3-4 weeks of age, they can exit the den and they are fully weaned by 4 weeks. They den for about 12 weeks, after which the pups travel with the pack. They maintain multiple dens so they can move the pups to a safer place if a den site is threatened.

They also maintain rendezvous sites where pups may be left while older family members go to hunt. Pups such as these have not been abandoned and do not need human intervention to survive. They are highly social and share 95% of

behaviours and emotions with domestic dogs (things such as playing, expressing joy, love or loneliness with their family members). They communicate with one another (family member and non-related coyotes) by vocalizing with 12 different sounds (more than dogs have). These sounds can express danger, be used to locate pack members, for mating calls and for mourning. This has earned them the nickname "Song Dogs". They also communicate by scent marking, using scat and urine and soil scratching, and body displays.

Coyotes help control the rodent, rabbit and hare populations, as well as other animals like raccoons and skunks. This helps control zoonotic disease such as hanta virus and plague, as well as helping ground nesting birds and songbirds by reducing predation on eggs and young birds by predators like the afore mentioned raccoons and skunks.

Sadly, coyotes are killed in large numbers every year in Canada and the U.S. by hunters, vehicle strikes, and in wildlife killing contests. Many jurisdictions do not have limits on numbers of coyotes that can be killed, or do not enforce these limits.

Blueridge Sharing Garden Update

The District of North Vancouver has recently granted the Blueridge Sharing Garden \$2000 to continue our garden box rebuilding project. This award is provided by the District's Sustainability Grant Program, which provides funds to support small-scale, community-based environment and sustainability projects. The funds will buy the cedar boards, screws, gravel & soil to rebuild another four boxes early next year, as soon as the rain lets up in the spring to make working outside slightly less unpleasant. Building on the success of the last two years, we'll spend one spring weekend disassembling four of the old boxes, and another weekend building the new boxes. If you like getting your hands dirty (literally), keep your eyes on this space for when the first work party gets scheduled, probably around March /April, weather permitting.

Cycling Improvements Coming to Mt Seymour Parkway

The District of North Vancouver is planning to have cycling lane improvements completed on Mount Seymour Parkway by the end of next summer. This work will provide more separation between vehicles and bicycles and include a combination of increased bike lane width, new buffers, flex posts, and precast curbs along the 4km stretch between Seymour Blvd and Mount Seymour Rd.

This should greatly improve safety on this stretch of road, and make the route to Parkgate Shopping Centre more accessible for more cyclists.

I expect there will still be equipment and workers down there, repairing or installing some fencing, and removing various debris. Other work might be possible, but the trail closure signs are down and you can once again get all the way from Pipeline Bridge to Seymour Suspension Bridge along Fisherman's Trail.

North Shore Young Civic Forum

North Shore, it's time to admit we have a problem: Young people are missing from our local decision-making.

Fortunately, the North Shore Young Civic Forum is back!

Though local governments have jurisdiction and decision-making responsibility for a broad variety of government services, land use and taxes, younger adults are often missing from the conversation. As a result, decisions and policies may not always reflect younger adults' needs, interests and preferences.


Now in its 4th year, the Forum is designed to address the lack of participation in and influence of younger people in North Shore municipalities' overall community engagement processes, council meetings and policy and decision making at the local government level.

This Democracy Café initiative (courtesy of North Shore Community Resources) will equip participants with the tools to engage with their local governments directly and participate in public processes such as Council meetings, public hearings, public engagement processes. The Forum will run from the beginning of February to mid-May 2024. The cohort will get to hear from city leaders, Indigenous leaders and advocates on what local governments do and how to engage with them. Participants will then get to

develop projects in small groups to spark some of the changes that these groups would like to see on the North Shore and present their project to one of the three municipal councils on the North Shore.

The program is open to young adults aged (18-39) who live, work, and/or study on the North Shore. Utilizing intersectional approaches and equitable practices, the Forum aims to foster a safe yet dynamic learning environment. Applications are welcome from individuals with diverse backgrounds and experiences, regardless of prior knowledge in civic engagement. In recognition that some communities have been historically disenfranchised and excluded from civic processes, people from underrepresented communities are invited to apply.




