Chemtrade Rezoning - Public Hearing

Since early 2024, the BCA has been following the rezoning application for the Chemtrade chlorine plant on Amherst Ave. Chemtrade is a major producer of chlorine for drinking water purification, and they are in the process of applying for rezoning from the DNV to allow them to continue production at that site for the foreseeable future.

The process is now at the stage where a public hearing is happening to let the DNV Council hear the perspectives of residents and businesses in the area. That hearing is tentatively scheduled for:

- February 24th
- 7pm

However, as we go to press, that date is still potentially subject to change. The final event can be confirmed the week before by visiting the [DNV website](#).

Happy Birthday to Bears

This is a special time of year for our local black bears, indeed for all black bears: this is when they are being born!

All black bears are born at about the same time: the end of January or the beginning of February, so they all have the same birthday. Some First Nations call the full moon at this time of year the Bear Moon in honour of this event.

The cubs are born while their moms are in torpor (sort of like hibernation) in their dens. This den could be at the base of a tree, inside a hollow tree, or maybe in a crevice under a rock. Sometimes bears will even find a cozy spot under a deck or a shed. If the moms have moved a little further up the mountain, her den may be covered in a thick layer of snow.

Females that have gained enough body fat in the fall and who mated in the summer will be among the first to den up. Usually, we see this around the end of November.

She will have prepared the den in the fall by excavating it and then using her claws to rake in a layer of leaves, twigs, and moss for insulation and padding. Then, in she goes, and this is when the magic happens.

The eggs that were fertilized in the early summer have been in stasis ever since. They will now implant in her uterine wall and start to develop. She is only pregnant for about two months. During torpor, her body temperature drops, and her breathing and heart rate slow. She dozes but occasionally will get up and turn around. She gives birth to her cubs, cleans them, and continues to doze.

Black bears commonly have 1, 2, or 3 cubs (rarely, up to 5!). The number she has will partly depend on how much weight she gained in the fall. Her body knows she needs to sustain a pregnancy and herself solely from this weight. So, if her body fat is too low, the fertilized eggs will be reabsorbed, and she may try again the following year. If she's put on a lot of weight (maybe from our food waste or bird feeders), she may have more than one cub.

Bears have an extremely low birth-to-adult weight ratio for a mammal – they weigh only about 1 pound at birth! Their eyes and ear canals are closed, and their body is covered in fine hair, not fur. They stay warm by cozying up to their mother's belly area, where her fur is thinner so the cubs have access to her body heat. They have no teeth yet but do come equipped with paws full of claws.

The cubs now have a big job to do: gain enough weight by the end of April to come out of the den. They do this by nursing. Bears have incredibly rich milk, between 20 and 25% fat, compared to humans' milk, which is between 3 and 5% fat. By the time the babies come out of the den, they will weigh up to 8 pounds each. It's no wonder they make a happy, purring sound while they nurse.

Mother bears are amazing: they can have a pregnancy, give birth, and nurse their cubs for months, all without eating or drinking. This is why she may emerge from her den up to 30% lighter than when she went in, and with several bouncing baby bears to teach and look after.

You can recycle your plastic bags and flexible plastic packaging there for free.

Someday we might get pink bins here in the District, but so far there is no discussion of that option at Council meetings.

Notes from the Sausage Factory

These are highlights from DNV council meetings, intended to help Blueridge residents keep up with local government happenings that may impact our neighbourhood. Not every item before the council is mentioned.

Jan 12 Meeting:

There were four items on the agenda for this meeting. The first two - Tenant Relocation Assistance and a change to the Official Community Plan (OCP) to allow 12 townhouses on Glenaire Drive - aren't particularly relevant to Blueridge residents. The next item was the [Chemtrade rezoning application](#), and it definitely is relevant to us. Chemtrade is applying for rezoning to allow them to continue producing chlorine at their Amherst Ave facility. If approved, they will make a number of investments to make the plant safer. Staff recommended giving the rezoning application its first reading and sending it to a public hearing. Council was largely supportive of this item, but there were questions on various topics and references to a lot of history around previous changes at the site. In the end, the first reading passed unanimously, and the public hearing was tentatively set for February 24th. The final item was appointing the chief and deputy elections officers (Genevieve Lanz and Rhonda Schell, respectively) for the DNV for the upcoming 2026 general election, which passed unanimously.

Jan 13 Workshop:

This meeting was a chance for DNV staff to provide a brief overview of their current priorities in Community and Development Planning as we approach the election this fall and to seek feedback to be sure they are doing what Council actually wants. Major items in the pipeline include the development of bylaws to

support Inclusionary Zoning, which will give Council a new way to create affordable housing in some developments; the implementation of [Small-Scale Multi-Unit Housing](#) (SSMUH), which is required as a result of Bill 25; and the general zoning bylaw update, which is intended to simplify the entire building process for everyone involved. Council asked a lot of questions, but the single biggest concern raised seemed to be that staff is asking for a lot of input on very complex issues, but Council doesn't have detailed economic forecasts or analysis or other information needed to make the right decisions. Note that there is a workshop on SSMUH coming up on February 9th and one on the zoning bylaw rewrite on February 10th.

Jan 26 Meeting:

This meeting covered a lot of ground, and as usual, much of it wasn't directly related to Blueridge/Seymour Heights or our residents. The relevant items were:

Due to provincial law changes, the DNV has reworked the Fire and Rescue Services bylaw. According to the Council, these changes are administrative in nature. The few significant changes will be communicated to businesses where needed through the regular inspection process. This was given first, second, and third readings.

The Fees and Charges bylaw was given first, second, and third readings. In general, fees will go up 5.5% on average based on a previous vote by Council. Documentation provided with the meeting listed the specific fees affected and included the full modified text of the bylaw, which also saw some minor textual changes. Most of these updated fees will not affect anyone in day-to-day affairs. Councillors generally accepted these increases but noted that costs are going up, and everything that adds to them makes things more difficult for all residents and businesses.

A set of changes to Development Permits, Minor Variance Permits, and Public Hearings also got council support. These specific changes are related to commercial development, but this is only the first set of changes coming as part of the Development Application Permit Review (DAPR) process, which is intended to streamline the entire development process all across the District. Changes to the single-family development are coming in Q1 of 2026. There were minor concerns raised here about the possibility of the public losing some ability to have a voice in the development process, largely due to provincial legislation, but staff reassured Council that they will have the ability to request a

public hearing when needed.

Finally, a budget of \$1.9 million for social services grants was approved. Council were uniformly supportive of this spending, with some noting that the organizations receiving the grants were often more efficient than a government entity could be.
